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An occasion to focus on Greek shipping's truly global scope

GLOBALISATION may no longer be in political fashion in some quarters but its relationship with and dependency on shipping is something to celebrate.

That is exactly what the Lloyd's List Greek Shipping Awards 2016 did on December 2 in the packed ballroom of the Athenaeum InterContinental Hotel.

A record audience of nearly 1,200 guests watched in suspense as the winners, including some of the country's premier shipping companies, service organisations and maritime personalities, were announced.

Lloyd's List Intelligence data cited during the ceremony underlines the unparalleled global spread of the cross-trading Greek-owned fleet, the world's largest. Over the course of a year, 32% of Greek shipping capacity was trading to ports in Asia, while 23% was trading to North and South America. Europe claimed 20% of

Greek capacity movements, with 9% operating in African ports, the Middle East representing 11% of the fleet's calls and the remaining 5% of Greek shipping focused on the Australasian trades.

Underlining the industry's truly global scope, each of the 17 categories of award presented on the night was heralded with a different video message to the audience from Greek masters and crews on a variety of vessels all over the world, their positions pinpointed for the audience on an electronic map flashed up onto numerous large screens around the ballroom.

The internationality of the world's largest shipping awards event has been increasing for some years, as more of Greek shipowners' international business partners have been drawn to the keenly-awaited annual event.

In 2016 there was an added international dimension. The minister of Shipping and Island Policy, Panagiotis Kouroumblis, gave a speech on

behalf of the government, but for the first time his counterparts from both Malta and Cyprus also attended the Greek Shipping Awards. The three nations have been coordinating their maritime policies increasingly in recent times to have a stronger, unified voice in influencing European shipping policy.

Mr Kouroumblis said that the state, public institutions and private sector all had to work together in order to find common ground and jointly tackle the economic crisis in Greece. Greek shipping in particular could play a multifaceted role in developing the country, he said.

Another key welcome speech was delivered by Junichiro lida, executive vice president of ClassNK, the event's overall lead sponsor.

Guests enjoyed a welcome reception hosted by Malta Ship Registry, which was addressed by Joe Mizzi, Malta's minister of Transport and

Bulk carrier and reefer owner Panos Laskaridis, who is also president-designate of the European Community Shipowners Associations, was crowned Greek Shipping Personality of the Year while Safe Bulkers chief executive Polys Hajioannou was named Newsmaker of the Year, the only award conferred directly by Lloyd's List.

A prestigious panel of judges representing the Greek shipping community voted Nicos D. Efthymiou, a former president of the Union of Greek Shipowners, the winner of the Lloyd's List / Propeller Club Lifetime Achievement Award for 2016.

Stavroula Betsakou, head of tanker research at Howe Robinson Partners, won the Next Generation Shipping Award.

Peter Hinchliffe, secretary general of the International Chamber of Shipping, was chosen as International Personality of the Year, the sole award open only to non-Greeks.

Greek Seafarer of the Year for 2016 was Captain Diamantis Papageorgiou, the master of Hellenic Seaways' ferry 'Nissos Rodos', who has a reputation for captaining vessels on some of the country's more difficult island routes.

Major company awards went to Samos Steamship Co., the Inglessis family company with a 140-year background in shipping, as Dry Cargo Company of the Year, and Thenamaris, long seen as one of Greece's premier shipping companies, as Tanker Company of the Year.

Minoan Lines of Crete, nowadays a member of the Grimaldi Group, scooped the prize for Passenger Line of the Year.

Carriers Chartering was named Shipbroker of the Year while National Bank of Greece won the Shipping Financier of the Year Award. Both were winning their respective categories for the second time.

The Tsakos Group had reasons to celebrate as newly-delivered LNG carrier 'Maria Energy'

was revealed as the Ship of the Year for 2016 and the group's vice-chairman Vassilis Papageorgiou won the Technical Achievement Award for his career achievements.

The Piraeus International Centre Award was won by Hemexpo - the Hellenic Marine Equipment Manufacturers and Exporters – which was established in 2014 to promote Greek-made equipment on ships constructed

The Eugenides Foundation was recognised with the Award for Achievement in Education or Training for its multi-faceted work supporting maritime education in Greece.

Helmepa Junior, the youth wing of the Hellenic Marine Environment Protection Association, was chosen for the 2016 Award for Achievement in Safety or Environmental Protection.


Moore Stephens was unveiled as winner of the Lloyd's List Intelligence Big Data Award for its OpCost operating costs benchmarking tool.




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Argo – a charity linked to the seafaring family

OF THE YEAR

THE 'Dry Cargo Company of the Year' Award for 2016 went to one of Greece's oldestestablished family shipping operations.

Samos Steamship traces its origins to 1875 when the Inglessis family began trading goods from the Aegean island of Samos using a small fleet of sailing ships.

Early family businesses based on the island included leather manufacturing, cigarette production and wine-making. When Samos Steamship was officially established in 1911 and a first steamship bought the same year, the vessel was employed transporting wine from Samos to France.

Over the years, the company has owned and operated various types of vessel, including passenger ships.

In the 1960s and '70s it ordered about 40 new multipurpose vessels and bulk carriers from Japanese shipyards. Dry cargo has historically been the company's primary focus although it has had a mixed fleet since diversifying into

tankers for the first time in the late 1980s.

Today Samos Steamship's fleet of 2m dwt capacity includes 12 bulkers.

Over the last year it has been expanding with bulker acquisitions, including the recent purchase of its largest-ever dry cargo vessel, the very large ore carrier G Pegasus. The 229,200 dwt vessel, renamed Vathy, was reportedly acquired for about \$12.6m.

Earlier in the year the company also acquired a new post-panamax and a 2006-

A characteristic of Samos Steamship's fleet is that all the vessels were built in Japan, the family's experience being that Japaneseconstructed ships are superior in quality and

The company's reinvestment in the dry bulk sector also includes two kamsarmaxes ordered from Sanoyas Shipbuilding for delivery

According to the nomination for Samos, "The Inglessis family, through its maritime tradition and culture of quality, represents the essence of the Greek shipping family that not only survived but thrived over challenging times."

Accepting the Award, Samos Steamship's managing director, Anastasios Tzamouranis, said: "For us this award comes as a recognition that our core principles of conducting business with respect to all people and minimum footprint to the environment is met with appreciation by our shipping society.

"It also gives us confidence that through these challenging times our steering is right.'

TANKER COMPANY OF THE YEAR

THENAMARIS has long been recognised not only as one of Greece's highly-rated tanker companies but one of the most advanced worldwide in its systems, planning and treatment of employees.

Many of today's leading Greek shipowners began their career with Thenamaris and were encouraged by the company to launch their own operations.

In the year and a half prior to the 2016 awards cut-off the company reinvested heavily in the industry with the intention of renewing the fleet and maintaining its strong presence in traditional segments, as well as building on new moves into areas such as gas shipping.

Taking advantage of lower prices in 2015, Thenamaris placed orders for two new very large crude carriers from Hyundai Heavy Industries as well as acquiring a 10 year-old VLCC secondhand. The company also exercised options for two suezmax

newbuildings at Hyundai Samho Heavy Industries and doubled its orders at Hyundai Mipo Dockyard for 38,000 cu m liquefied petroleum gas carriers.

This brought Thenamaris' fleet to about 60 tankers including 10 on order, as well as three liquefied natural gas carriers in operation and four LPG carriers on order.

The company has proactively sought assessment under leading environmental programmes such as the Green Award and was the first European ship management company to comply with the Voluntary Best Achievable Protection (VBAP) standards, and subsequently with the even stricter **Exceptional Compliance Program** (ECOPRO) standards. Both are part of Washington State's voluntary compliance programme which aims to control marine pollution risks.

It is also recognised within the industry for its systems linking the office with the vessel

and its sophistication in using data to help plan maintenance and procurement.

Other positives noted by the panel included Thenamaris' corporate social responsibility that has manifested itself in support for organisations helping vulnerable social groups. In the last two years the company has also backed a training scheme giving high school students the chance to participate in sailing voyages, raising awareness of life and

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PASSENGER LINE OF THE YEAR

MINOAN Lines, now in its fifth decade, began as a multi-shareholder company established in Crete and in recent years has been a member of the Grimaldi Group, though its headquarters continues to be in Heraklion, Crete.

Winning the Award was the company's second victory in the passenger line category. This time it won the support of the judging panel for a number of reasons: the quality of its ships and services, its increasing investment in Hellenic Seaways, the leading domestic ferry operator, and its impressive results as it emerges from the crisis plaguing the sector.

Reflecting increased efficiency and successful marketing, Minoan doubled its profit to €12m in the first half of 2016, the best first-half result in its 44-year history. Further improvement took net income for the first nine months of 2016 to €24.4m on turnover of about €128m.

During the year Minoan was the leading operator linking mainland Greece to the Italian ports in the Central and Northern Adriatic, as well as between Piraeus and Herakling

Customer loyalty has been a priority for Minoan and its Bonus Club, launched 11 years ago, reached 270,000 members in 2016.
On-line booking and ticket purchasing, as well as company use of social media, vastly increased in 2016.

Judges also praised Minoan for incorporating social responsibility at the heart of its business model and agenda. Among the company's support initiatives are many sports, cultural and artistic sponsorships as well as medical causes and monasteries and religious welfare institutions in Crete and mainland Greece.

For the poor, unemployed, people with special disabilities, large families, students and other special categories of passenger, the company offers lower fares.

The year also saw Minoan expand its participation in the country's leading domestic ferry operator, Hellenic Seaways, to more than 48%. It has made no secret of its aim to take control of HSW, which operates a fleet of more than 20 vessels to more than 40 destinations in the Aegean.

Minoan's focus on domestic Greek services is set to intensify after its two chartered-in cruise ferries in the Adriatic were returned to Grimaldi at the end of 2016.

SHIPBROKER OF THE YEAR

ESTABLISHED in Greece in 1980 as an independent broking house, Carriers Chartering has won the 'Shipbroker of the Year' Award on one previous occasion, in

But the judging panel recognised that it has evolved and expanded since then, becoming increasingly international.

The company specialises in dry cargo chartering as well as sale & purchase of bulkers, tankers, containerships and some other specialised vessels.

Clients nominating Carriers drew attention not only to the company's service but also to the reputation it has established with leading international charterers that has been a reliable source of spot and period charter employment. It was also singled out for its ethical approach to business relationships.

The company has set its sights on being a one-stop shop for shipowners, charterers and operators.

Carriers' chartering department is divided into three desks focusing respectively on the capesize, panamax and handysize to supramax sectors. Each desk concentrates on marketing tonnage that is exclusive or close to Carriers. while another team follows charterers, trading houses and operators.

In addition to this, the team has been praised for its research and reporting for clients as well as a wealth of "off-market" information provided daily to customers.

The dry cargo chartering team has risen to 23 experienced brokers. In the last year it was enhanced with the addition of five new brokers and three more operators, in spite of the poor dry bulk market background.

The volume of vessel fixtures has grown rapidly in the last two years. 2016 was a particularly good year for Carriers with more than 650 deals in the first nine months. This compared with a 2015 full-year total of 707 fixtures, 533 in 2014 and 431 in 2013.

A separate post-fixing and operations department has grown to seven operators to take care of any issues arising during the employment of vessels.

Carriers' S&P department consists of four brokers covering all shipping sectors on a global basis. Services include not only contracting of newbuildings and secondhand sales and purchases, but repairs, demolitions and valuations for owners and banks.

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SHIPPING FINANCIER OF THE YEAR

THE panel's choice of National Bank of Greece as 'Shipping Financier of the Year' reflected judges' support for the efforts of the longest-established Greek bank in the business.

NBG has been on the banking scene for 175 years and in shipping finance for a century. During the 1960s, it became the first among the Greek banks to establish a significant presence financing modern Greek shipping.

Led by the late Alexandros Tourkolias, a strong supporter of shipping who eventually became the bank's chief executive, NBG expanded as a major lender from the 1990s onwards.

Mr Tourkolias died in 2016 and in selecting NBG as the shipping bank of the year several judges cited his outstanding contribution to the industry.

NBG entered the year as one of the largest five lenders to Greek shipowners and today it

maintains a portfolio of loans to the country's owners amounting to about \$2.6bn. At the time of the Awards ceremony, it had \$45m of new commitments in place.

As this implies, despite difficult conditions, the bank has been selectively lending to stand by its existing clients.

The portfolio is described as highly collateralised with vessels of an average 13 years of age. It reflects the mix of Greek shipping, being mainly oriented towards oceangoing tankers and bulkers, with a lesser presence in container vessels and coastal shipping.

The year also saw the bank launch 'Value Chain – Shipping' as a Supply Chain Finance tool, to support the wider maritime cluster. In particular the new tool has been providing trade finance and advice to support Greek maritime manufacturing exports. The new initiative for the shipping cluster is seen as a

pilot that may be adapted for other industries

Accepting the Award, NBG's chief executive Leonidas Fragkiadakis, vowed that NBG would continue to finance shipping which he described as a strategic industry for Greece.

"In the last few years we have faced many challenges in the banking sector and even more in shipping," he said. "But all this time, including the past year, we have not stopped financing shipping."

VASSILIS Papageorgiou received the 2016 Technical Achievement Award for a 53-year career in which he has been at the heart of many of the technical accomplishments of modern Greek shipping.

Today he is vice chairman of the Tsakos Group. But he began his career during the golden age of Greek shipyards. In the 1970s, he supervised repairs and new constructions in Hellenic Shipyards, Elefsis Shipyards and Chalkis Shipyards as well as attending repairs and newbuildings in Japan and Yugoslavia for Carras Shipping.

A qualified naval architect and marine engineer, with a Masters degree in internal combustion engines, management and economics, Mr Papageorgiou joined Lloyd's Register in 1980, initially as a junior surveyor in the Far East.

He became the first surveyor of Greek nationality at LR to supervise newbuilding construction in Asia. Subsequently he also made history as the first Greek to be appointed senior principal surveyor for LR and later area managing director for Greece, the Balkans and Middle East.

After 23 years with LR he accepted the role of vice president for the Tsakos Group which included taking over the group's newbuilding section. In the last 13 years he has overseen the construction of more than 70 vessels of various types in a range of countries.

According to the successful nomination for Mr Papageorgiou, he has been instrumental in raising tanker design specification standards that "thereafter have gradually been established as an industry norm.

"He stands out with his astute technical proficiency and ability to drive forward advancements for the maritime industry. He does so with integrity, decency, earnest dedication and a great deal of zeal and passion [making him] a frontrunner for a better and more safety-focused industry," the nomination

said. He is also active on a number of industry technical committees.

"Achievement in every field of work is the result of commitment, enthusiasm, passion, determination and very hard work," said Mr Papageorgiou, accepting the Award. "We work to learn from the past and to build a better future and we do so by expanding our horizons and by setting an example to the new generation that will take over from us."

ACHIEVEMENT IN SAFETY OR ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION

HELMEPA Junior was a popular winner of the Award for its environmental efforts. Moreover the choice of winner was one of those coincidences that will have particularly pleased the award-sponsor, as the Lloyd's Register Foundation has been a major financial supporter of Helmepa Junior for a number of years.

Helmepa Junior is a schools-based initiative of the Hellenic Marine Environment Protection Organisation (Helmepa), that was launched as a non-governmental, non-profit organisation by the Greek shipping and seafaring community back in 1982. Each year the educational programme offers about 6,500 kids of up to 13 years of age the chance to receive environmental information and to become involved in various activities focused on protecting the environment.

Accepting the Award, Helmepa Junior was quick to underline that in essence it honours some 92,000 pupils and 3,400 teachers who

have voluntarily participated in the programme from its inception in 1993 to the present.

Helmepa Junior came into being during Basil Papachristidis' chairmanship of Helmepa, with generous financial support from Captain Vassilis Konstantakopoulos. The initial programme was designed by Ypatia Mitsatsos.

In 2016, members of the programme carried out a record 3,900 activities throughout Greece – ranging from cleaning up beaches and parks to recording and analysing garbage collected, recycling and raising environmental awareness in their communities.

Over the years, Helmepa Junior has been recognised at the International Maritime Organisation and its activities have been emulated in countries ranging from nearby Cyprus to faraway Australia.

The Award was accepted by Helmepa chairman George Gratsos together with the chairperson of Helmepa Junior's representative board, 12 year-old Olympia

Zisi from Thessaloniki, and the board's secretary, 13 year-old Constantinos Kolovos from Athens.

Thanking Lloyd's List for the Award, Olympia promised that the kids of Helmepa Junior would "continue protecting the seas and beaches of our country with the same enthusiasm." Constantinos urged the Greek shipping community to continue supporting the programme, enabling the children to create a brighter future.

The Award for Achievement in Safety or Environmental Protection was sponsored by Llovd's Register.



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INTERNATIONAL PERSONALITY OF THE YEAR

PETER Hinchliffe has been secretary general of the International Chamber of Shipping (ICS), the principal international trade association for the shipping industry, representing shipowners and operators in all sectors, and its sister organisation, the International Shipping Federation (ISF), since July 2010.

The panel of judges recognised him as a tireless and eloquent diplomat and campaigner for world shipping.

The combined membership of ICS and ISF comprises 36 national shipowners' associations and represents more than 80% of the world's merchant tonnage.

One of the principal roles of the organisations is to coordinate the representation of the international maritime industry at the International Maritime Organization, the International Labour Organization, and at other intergovernmental fora which influence the interests and well-being of international shipping.

Established in 1921, ICS is concerned with all technical, legal, employment affairs and policy issues affecting the industry. The Chamber also develops best practices and guidance, including a wide range of publications and free resources that are used by companies globally.

Mr Hinchliffe joined ICS in 2001 and for several years, as its marine director, he led ICS representation on safety and environmental issues at the IMO as well as speaking on behalf of international shipping at other UN agencies and on conference platforms around the world.

Mr Hinchliffe is widely regarded as always knowing what he's talking about and is a down to earth but commanding voice wherever he

His first career was in the Royal Navy. In this exciting career that spanned 27 years, he served at sea in most ship types but specialised as a submariner and commanded diesel and nuclear powered submarines for

more than five years. He also spent two years managing the Royal Navy's Tactical Development Centre.

He has an honours degree in Systems and Management. In addition to his other roles, he is a vice president of the Nautical Institute.

In the last two-to-three years Mr Hinchliffe has been a pragmatic but passionate voice, representing the interests of shipowners and seafarers, especially on major and controversial subjects such as piracy, the refugee rescue crisis, emissions and ballast water treatment.

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SEAFARER OF THE YEAR

SEAFARER of the Year is traditionally one of the warmest-received categories of Award at the Greek Shipping Awards each year and 2016 was no exception.

The panel chose from a shortlist endorsed by the Panhellenic Seamen's Federation and the Award went to one of the best-known ferry Masters in the country's coastal trades.

Amazingly, Captain Diamantis Papageorgiou has served as Master of more than 50 different ferries in the Greek coastal fleet and is known for being entrusted with the most difficult routes.

While it may be true that no-one is irreplaceable, Capt Papageorgiou comes close. Reflecting this, in his 16 years as a captain he has taken a total of only one-and-a-half months' holiday leave.

Currently, he is Master of the 1987-built ro-ro/passenger ferry 'Nissos Rodos' for Hellenic Seaways and he typifies the company's commitment to provide a

service to the islands under often difficult conditions

The 192.5m-long ferry, which carries up to 1,600 passengers, is a large vessel for many of the tiny Aegean ports it visits and the service requires a brave and skilled Master.

Illustrating another recent aspect of the service, in 2016 alone Capt Papageorgiou's vessel transported 65,000 migrants and refugees from the islands to the Greek

"It is really the greatest honour for me to be awarded today as a Captain and I am sharing it with all my colleagues who, at this very moment, are onboard their ships trying to connect the island complex of our country under difficult circumstances," said Capt Papageorgiou, accepting the Award.

Today's ferries were "twice the size of those which served 50 years ago, but at the same time, the ports and port facilities remained

"This disproportion of sizes between ports and ships, along with the adverse weather conditions, make our job extremely demanding, where mistakes are not forgiven," he said.

"But the Greek captain matured within these conditions and often makes heroic efforts in order to sail the route safely and serve the needs of island communities."

The Seafarer of the Year Award was sponsored by the Tsavliris Salvage Group.







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ACHIEVEMENT IN EDUCATION OR TRAINING

SINCE its establishment in 1956, the Eugenides Foundation has been a consistent, multi-faceted supporter of marine education, remaining so to this day.

Among the highlights of its work over the last 60 years, the Foundation has published 134 books for marine education among a total of more than 500 textbooks, distributed in more than 50m copies.

It recently spent more than 700,000 euros to repair and refurbish the Merchant Marine Academy of the Ionian Islands in Cephalonia after the island and the school suffered earthquake damage in 2014.

It has donated simulators and other equipment to many of the nation's academies and since 1989 has provided 60 scholarships for Coast Guard officers to study shipping.

In the past the foundation donated the training ship 'Eugenios Eugenides' and its many other

initiatives include conferences and studies of the Merchant Marine Schools.

The focus on marine education is part of the wider part played by the foundation since it was set up according to the will of the prominent shipowner and philanthropist Eugene Eugenides to help educate young Greeks in science and technology.

Over the years, the foundation, which also hosts the state-of-the-art Athens Planetarium, has spent more than \$400m on social and educational projects. In addition to the 60 Coast Guard scholarships, it has provided another 440 scholarships for graduates of the National Technical University of Athens.

Meanwhile the planetarium, which first opened in 1966, has hosted 3.5m visitors since it was fully modernised in 2003.

Accepting the Award, the foundation's president, Leonidas Demetriades-Eugenides,

dedicated it first of all to Eugene Eugenides, and thereafter to the founder's sister, Marianthi Simou, who was its first governor, and to her successor Nikolaos Vernikos-Eugenides.

The foundation was "effectively the child of the ocean-going shipping industry" and he pledged that a large part of its activities would continue to support marine education in the future.

The Award for Achievement in Education or Training was sponsored by the Target Marine Group.

SHIP OF THE YEAR

SINCE the 'Ship of the Year' Award was introduced in 2006, winners have been drawn from the ranks of passenger ferries, bulk carriers and container vessels, offshore support vessels and drillships. Unique victories have been scored by an anti-pollution vessel and even a restored Liberty vessel used as a floating museum.

But prior to 2016 no liquefied natural gas carrier had won the title, in spite of the remarkable investment by leading Greek shipping groups in the LNG sector in recent years.

While there have been other sophisticated LNG carriers constructed for Greeks that might have been equally worthy winners, this anomaly has now been put right by the selection of the 174,000 cu m 'Maria Energy' as the latest 'Ship of the Year'.

Delivered by Hyundai Heavy Industries as recently as October 7, 2016, the 'Maria Energy' is doubtless a state-of-the-art and, additional to that, iconic vessel.

The GTT Mark III membrane-type carrier is just the second LNG vessel constructed for tanker owner Tsakos Energy Navigation and is the company's first with tri-fuel diesel electric propulsion capable of running on marine diesel, heavy fuel oil or natural gas.

Moreover, the vessel has the distinction of being the 100th newbuilding for the Tsakos Group.

Named in memory of Maria Tsakos, the owner's sister and daughter of group founder Captain Panagiotis Tsakos, the vessel has been linked with her vision to protect and promote the development of talented and underprivileged young people, such as the children hosted on educational and residential scholarships at 'Maria's House' in Chios.

Commercially, the vessel has been given a decent start to its career with an inaugural three-year charter of up to three years.

Technical highlights of the vessel include a low boil-off rate of no more than 0.09% of cargo volume per day.

The 'Maria Energy' is fitted with twin propellers and boss cap fins for hydrodynamic improvement, exhaust gas economisers for each engine and a dynamic trim assistant.

All the main equipment of the vessel is linked to an on-line ship performance monitoring system and efficiency is further improved through a condition-based maintenance system.

The Ship of the Year Award was sponsored by RightShip.

NEXT GENERATION SHIPPING AWARD

STAVROULA Betsakou joined the Howe Robinson Partners (former ICAP Shipping) Tanker Research team in 2009 and she has now logged 14 years in the shipping industry, the last seven of these becoming an increasingly admired analyst of the crude and product tanker markets.

Today, as head of Tanker Research for Howe Robinson, she leads a team of four analysts, operating from London and Singapore.

She had previously worked for Lyras Maritime from 2006 and prior to that for Mediterranean Shipping Company (MSC) Greece S.A. from 2002.

She holds a bachelor degree in Maritime Studies from the University of Piraeus and an MSc in Shipping, Trade and Finance from Cass Business School in London.

Ms Betsakou is among the most in-demand tanker trade analysts in the world. She has performed over 220 tanker market presentations in 21 cities around the world and is regularly invited to contribute to clients' board and management meetings as an external strategy advisor.

She delivers annual guest lectures on the oil and tanker markets to postgraduate shipping students at Cass Business School and Henley Business School

The Greek Shipping Awards judging panel is not alone in acclaiming Ms Betsakou as a rising star of the industry. Earlier in the year, she also won the 2016 international Seatrade Awards 'Young Person in Shipping' Award.

Furthermore, Ms Betsakou was included in Riviera Maritime's '50 Tanker Shipping & Trade Industry Leaders' survey which identified her as one of the industry's most exciting young talents, capable of "note-perfect" presentations and market assessments while being unafraid to offer "clinical" market predictions.

"We all have a role to play to help the people who come out of our universities and have studied shipping to find their way in the industry and to let them know that they can aim high, regardless of their background," she told the audience as she accepted the Award.

The Next Generation Shipping Award was sponsored by IRI/The Marshall Islands Registry.





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BIG DATA AWARD

The 'Big Data' Award was introduced to the Greek Shipping Awards in 2015 and the winner is chosen by Lloyd's List Intelligence.

In its second year the Award went to the international accountant and shipping adviser Moore Stephens for OpCost, the market-leading ship operating costs benchmarking tool.

It is avidly used by the shipping community, especially at times of adverse market conditions, such as those of the last few years, when cost savings assume an even greater importance for many companies.

The Greek market is the biggest contributor to the Opcost database with about 730 vessels, or about 25% of the total, and is one of its keenest users. As Opcost draws on financial data, the tool is also seen as a significant sign of market confidence in Moore Stephens.

According to the global project leader for OpCost, Richard Greiner, OpCost can also be used for business and budget planning, and transfer pricing studies. "The most widely respected barometer of ship operating costs in the industry, it is available in a user-friendly online format, and is continually supplemented with new data to provide the shipping industry with the information it needs to monitor and plan its expenditure," he said.

Accepting the Award, Costas
Constantinou, managing partner of
Moore Stephens in Greece, said:
"Whether from its early primitive days
with hundreds of spreadsheets used by
my father back in the '70s or in
its present day web programme, OpCost
covers the same basic need -the need to
compare like with like and the need to
ensure that the costs are within the
market"

The Award recognises the significant potential that big data has to transform shipping, from timely insights drawn from real-time monitoring and forecasting of events, to improved management of performance and risk.

Candidates were required to demonstrate measurable results in areas such as strategic business/investment planning, performance monitoring and optimisation, condition-based and predictive maintenance, optimisation across systems and system overview of operations.

The LLI Big Data Award was sponsored by Cyprus, Department of Merchant Shipping.



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NICOS D. Efthymiou is a native son of Piraeus, the home port of the Greek merchant fleet. Throughout his life he has been a staunch supporter of its institutions, including its famed football club, Olympiakos FC, which he chaired briefly during the 1980s.

He grew up working in the ship agency business established by his father Dimitrios just before the Second World War and was educated in Athens and at City of London University in the UK.

After the family's diversification into shipowning, initially in partnership with Anthony Angelicoussis, he represented the company in London.

From 1973 onwards the London office was Liberty Maritime, established in partnership with Markos Frangos.

After returning to Greece in 1981, he took the reins of Efthymiou D. Shipping and joined the board of the Union of Greek Shipowners, later serving as vice president.

During the 1970s and 1980s, the family company took delivery of Japanese-built Freedom vessels and newbuilding bulk carriers.

In 2003 he was elected president of the Union of Greek Shipowners and served the maximum two terms of three years each. He remained on the board of the Union until 2012.

During his tenure, achievements included the implementation of government measures to improve the competitiveness of the Greek ship registry and successfully leading resistance to double-hull requirements for bulk carriers.

The Union also stepped up its social contributions after a series of wildfires ravaged Greece. A landmark gesture was donating a fleet of ambulances and fire-fighting vehicles to the country's under-funded emergency services.

He has long been a champion of the Greek flag, Greek seafarers and development of Piraeus into a full-service international maritime and business centre. As UGS president, Mr Efthymiou gave principled leadership in cases such as the Prestige accident in Spain and the Tasman Spirit spill in Pakistan when Greek seafarers found themselves bearing the brunt of the backlash from national and local authorities.

Such incidents undermined efforts that he strongly supported to attract young Greeks to the seagoing profession, not only as a resource for the industry but also as an employment solution for a generation of impoverished youth.

Accepting the 'Lifetime Achievement' Award, Mr Efthymiou urged the younger generation to stick with shipping, "the main industry of our country".

The Lloyd's List/Propeller Club Lifetime Achievement Award was sponsored by ABS.





GREEK SHIPPING NEWSMAKER OF THE YEAR

NEWSMAKER of the Year is an Award that is always decided directly by senior editorial staff at Lloyd's List.

Over the years, personalities linked to publicly-traded companies have had a definite edge in the news-related category. However 2016 was a year in which many listed companies were forced on the defensive under the harsh glare of public transparency and – frequently – shareholder dissatisfaction.

To a great extent, Polys Hajioannou emerged as winner of the Award by showing that you can make news in hard times by playing good defence and by being transparently fair to shareholders.

During the year his US-listed Safe Bulkers caught the eye for a number of initiatives. For example, it frequently updated investors on its successful negotiations on refinancing and loan amendments that have put it in a stronger position to navigate the bad market.

In all it agreed with its lenders to amend credit facilities aggregating \$472m. That represented all its commercial bank debt, excluding about \$130m in sale and leaseback financing and finance from a Japanese state institution. Impressive operating cost reductions were another feature of its strategy.

The company has been creative in finding new funds without diluting its shareholders, and secured \$16.9m of finance towards the cost of a kamsarmax newbuilding due in 2018 through an issue of redeemable shares to an outside investor.

But what really clinched the Award for Mr Hajioannou was his commitment to put the company first and fund this with his own cash.

The shipowner, who controls 56% of the company, twice came to the aid of Safe Bulkers in 2016 by buying vessels at a premium to average market prices, boosting

the company's liquidity and reducing capital expenditure needs.

In February, he agreed to buy two of the company's post-panamax bulkers for a combined \$29m, and took over newbuilding contracts for another two vessels due in 2018 and 2019.

By October two of Safe Bulkers' remaining four ships on order were also sold to the chief executive, wiping another \$48m off the company's spending commitments.

CREEK SHIPPING AWARDS

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GREEK SHIPPING PERSONALITY OF THE YEAR

PANOS Laskaridis has had a long and impressive shipping career since, together with brother Athanassios, he took the reins of their father's fishing business.

They created one of the world's largest reefer and fishing fleet logistics businesses and have steadily diversified into other businesses. Most recently, Laskaridis has built up one of Greece's largest bulk carrier fleets, to offset the global decline in the reefer business.

The group also includes two shiprepair yards in Spain and a fleet of small product-chemical tankers.

2016 was a landmark year with a number of secondhand dry bulk acquisitions and resale newbuilding projects that have lifted the bulker fleet to 41 vessels, ranging from ultramaxes up to newcastlemaxes, including six new deliveries scheduled for 2017.

Meanwhile the company has been astutely managing the fading reefer business although this still includes about 25 ships.

The year also saw Laskaridis extend its activities in dry bulk through an investment in a recently inaugurated dry bulk terminal in Montevideo, Uruguay. The new \$110m panamax terminal opened in mid-2016 and is aimed at growth in the export of grain and wood cargoes. It is the only berth that can fully load panamaxes in the River Plate without the need for topping off cargo in another location.

Laskaridis partnered Brazilian private equity fund Patria and the Promon Group in the project.

Mr Laskaridis contributes to the industry in many ways and is currently vice-president of Ecsa – the European Community Shipowners' Associations. He is due to take over the presidency in January 2018 – an increasingly important position from the perspective of Greek shipping's concerns with Brussels.

The shipowner is also a strong supporter of social, educational and cultural causes and


projects, many of these supported through the Aikaterini Laskaridis Foundation.

Accepting the 'Personality of the Year' Award, Mr Laskaridis emphasised the contribution of shipping to the Greek economy – through employment, wealth-creation and bringing foreign exchange.

Another "intangible but most important" contribution was that the 300,000 people involved in the national shipping community, both in the offices and at sea, offered an example to the rest of the population of being first in their field.

"What it takes is hard work, discipline, not blaming others for what is wrong with you and endless work," he said.

The Greek Shipping Personality of the Year Award was sponsored by Eurobank.



Tradition of credibility upheld by illustrious panel

WHILE the annual Greek Shipping Awards gala dinner has become a firm favourite of the shipping community, the credibility of the Awards and the adjudication process behind them remains a priority for Lloyd's List and is key to the prestige of the prizes.

The system is as open and democratic as can be devised, while protecting the Awards from becoming a mere popularity contest.

Guaranteeing the quality of the decision-making is the consistently high calibre of the judging panel that devotes its collective expertise and integrity to the task of choosing the winners, based on shoals of written entries received from the industry at large.

The complexion of the 10-person panel is refreshed from year to year. This is to ensure that over time as many of the key industry bodies as possible are represented and that as many prominent representatives of the Greek shipping community, drawn from various sides of the industry, are able to participate in adjudication.

Four first-time judges joined the panel for 2016, bringing the total number of personalities to have served as judges in the 13 years since inception to nearly 60.

New faces included George D. Pateras, who was elected president of the Hellenic Chamber of

Shipping earlier in the year. Other fresh blood was provided by Liona Bachas, deputy president of the Hellenic Shipbrokers Association, Nicholas Vouyoukas, president of the Association of Banking and Financial Executives of Hellenic Shipping, and Nicholas Meimarides, chairman of Young Shipping Professionals Greece.

Experienced judges who returned to serve on the panel again in 2016 included Efthimios E. Mitropoulos, secretary general emeritus of the International Maritime Organization, Haralambos Fafalios, chairman of the Greek Shipping Co-operation Committee, Leonidas Demetriades-Eugenides, president of the Eugenides Foundation, and Wista Hellas president Angie Hartmann.

They joined panel 'regulars' Captain John Halas, leader of the Panhellenic Seamen's Federation, and Nigel Lowry of Lloyd's List.

Many of the 15 categories determined by the panel were hotly contested with multiple strong candidates receiving support until a final winner

The exceptions not adjudicated by the panel are Newsmaker of the Year and the Big Data Award. They are respectively decided directly by the Lloyd's List editorial team and Lloyd's List Intelligence.
